Where to from here?

Under ETRF legislation it is compulsory for students to stay at school until they finish Year 10 or have turned 16, whichever comes first. After this, students must participate in education and training for:

- a further two years; or
- until they have gained a Senior Statement
- until they have gained a Certificate III vocational qualification; or
- until they have turned 17

Alternatively, they could be working full-time (minimum 25 hours/week)

Senior Phase of Learning Years 10, 11 & 12

Our expectation is for each student to have a meaningful pathway and to establish the foundations for a successful future.

We expect each student who continues at Wynnum SHS to achieve a Queensland Certificate of Education (QCE).

QCE – Queensland Certificate of Education

A Queensland Certificate of Education will be awarded to young people when their course of study satisfies some specific requirements:

- a significant amount of learning
- a set standard of achievement

There is also a literacy and numeracy requirement.

A QCE will be awarded when a student has achieved

20 credits

+ Literacy and Numeracy requirements are met

QCE = 20 credits (including meeting literacy and numeracy requirements)

 For General and Applied subjects, the set standard is a pass (C) in each unit of study (maximum of 4 credits per subject if every unit is passed)

 For VET certificates, the set standard is completion (credits depend on the actual course and whether it is a Certificate II or Certificate III)

Subjects in the QCE System

- General subjects
- General (Extension) subjects (Units 3 & 4 only)
- Applied subjects
- Vocational Certificates

Units of Study, not Semesters of Study

Unit 1 and Unit 2:

- Represent the formative years of study.
- Developmentally less complex than Units 3 & 4.
- The results in Units 1 & 2 will not contribute to your ATAR but do count towards your QCE credits.

Unit 3 and Unit 4:

- Results from Units 3 & 4 will be combined a pass (C standard) at the end of the Year 12 will give you 2 QCE credits.
- This will lead to the overall raw subject result being used for scaling.
- These results are how your ATAR will be calculated.

If you think you might want to go to university...

Easiest way to get into uni straight from school is with an ATAR

but...there are other ways...it just might take longer



General subjects lead to university

But you can do combinations as long as at least 4 of your subjects are general subjects

What is the Australian Tertiary Admission Rank (ATAR)?

- Primary mechanism used nationally for tertiary admissions.
 Indicates a student's position relative to other students.
- 2,000 point scale from 99.95 down to 0.00
 - ATARs less than 30.00 will be expressed as "30 and below"
- Calculated by QTAC for entry into courses in 2025.
- Is the standard pathway to tertiary study in QLD.

Scaling QTAC are responsible for scaling

Scaling is necessary so that student results in different subjects can be compared <u>fairly</u>.

If a student studies General Maths subject they might get 90 / 100.

But if the same student studied a more challenging Maths subject eg. Maths Methods they might only get 80 / 100.

However, if scaling works, they should end up with the same scaled score.



Myths & Legends:

What pattern of subjects will guarantee an ATAR of 99.95?

Reality: No pattern will. The ATAR is entirely data driven, so if a student's results place them in the top percentile, then they will get the top ATAR.



Myths & Legends:

I will not qualify for an ATAR so higher education is closed off to me.

Reality: Some tertiary courses are accessible without a formal tertiary ranking like ATAR. There are other pathways to tertiary study, including via a Certificate III or higher qualification.

When deciding subjects think about:

- What is the subject about?
- What is the subject matter and skills I will learn?
- What aspects of this course align to my strengths, skills and interests?
- ► What pathways can this course lead me toward?
- Is there any subject that is a pre-requisite for further study I wish to do?
- ► How will I be assessed?




Important notice when choosing subjects

Some details

- Minimum specifications are set out by the school (available tonight)
